


Celebrating the Diamond Jubilee at: <http://www.jubileetimecapsule.org/>

As it says on the screen shot below, the only requirement, or limit, is that the entry be about one day in the last 60 years, and that the event happened in a Commonwealth country. It can be a birthday, a community event, a school memory, a world event - anything goes!



So log onto the link indicated above, and go to the 'Universe' screen. Click on one of the moving bubbles (or stars) to visualize all sorts of different contributions. Some are amazing, and some are not written in the most perfect "Queen's" English. But all are authentic!



You can send in an entry to the Time Capsule until September 30 - now is a little late for this end of year, but what better way to start off a brand new school year in September by writing about a memory, happening, event (researched or actually lived through), and let your students contribute to the Diamond Jubilee Celebration. They will probably never, ever forget it...
