

## LIMERICKS - SAYING THEM AND WRITING THEM - and using them in CLASS!!

- ❖ What is a limerick? It is a funny little nonsense poem containing 5 lines. It has a very distinctive rhythm and rhyme pattern.
- Rhyme Pattern: The last words of the **first, second, and fifth** lines all rhyme with each other - this is the "A" pattern
- The last words of the **third and fourth** lines also rhyme with each other - this is the "B" pattern
- ❖ A very famous example is :

There was an old man from Peru	A
Who dreamed he was eating his shoe	A
He woke in a fright	B
In the midst of the night	B
And found it was perfectly true	A

- ❖ Rhythm Pattern :

- ✚ The **first, second, and fifth** lines (the A rhymes) all have the following rhythm pattern:

da DUM da da DUM da da DUM (there are 3 DUMS, or strong beats).

Students say, "da **DUM** da da **DUM** da da **DUM**" (clapping hands here can help)

They then say, "There **was** an old **man** from Peru

The second line has the same pattern ; Who **thought** he was **eating** his **shoe**

As does the fifth : And **found** it was **perfectly true**

- ✚ The **third and fourth** lines (the B rhymes) have a different rhythm pattern:

da **DUM** da da **DUM** (there are 2 DUMS or strong beats)

say "da DUM da da DUM" out loud (clapping is good here too)

Try saying the two middle lines :

He woke **up** in a **fright**

In the **midst** of the **night**

There <b>was</b> an old <b>man</b> from Peru	A
Who <b>dreamed</b> he was <b>eating</b> his <b>shoe</b>	A
He woke <b>up</b> in a <b>fright</b>	B
In the <b>midst</b> of the <b>night</b>	B
And <b>found</b> it was <b>perfectly true</b>	A

❖ To write a limerick, it will have to have

- ✚ the AABBA pattern
- ✚ 3 dums, 3 dums, 2 dums, 2 dums, 3 dums too!

There are millions of limericks that have been written - below is a smattering for you to sample! Students love writing them, and they fit into any theme.

1. Beforehand :

Students work in pairs. Each group receives 2 limericks mixed up, and that have been cut into strips. They then put the strips of paper into what they think might be the correct order and read TOGETHER to the others.

2. Next in groups :

- Each student writes 5-6 places s/he's lived or visited.... cities, countries, addresses, etc. Or if they have an idea about a silly story, or thought, whatever!
- Choose the 2 places that are easiest to rhyme (this may take some experimenting and more than one try). Students try to come up with words that rhyme and which they then write in columns underneath the place names. This can be done using only the last syllable of the name.

Example :

Anney, Paree, (= Paris!), free, me, glee, she, bee

Train, pain, shame, main, same,

Example : (produced by students in a classe de 2°)

There once was a boy from Anney (pronounced Ancy!)

Who wanted to go to Paree

So he got on a train

But the price was a pain

'Cos he'd really thought it was free!

- ❖ For my 2° EURO (dnl Maths) class, I asked them to write out the mathematical formula for the following limerick! They found it amazingly easy!!

A Dozen, a Gross, and a Score,  
 plus three times the square root of four,  
 divided by seven,  
 plus five times eleven,  
 Is nine squared and not a bit more.

**Help** - a gross = 12 dozen items  
 A score = a group, or set of 20

$$\frac{12+144+20+3*\sqrt{4}}{7} + 5*11 = 9^2 + 0$$

- ❖ A template can sometimes help students to write limericks. They must use past tenses.

**Template - A:**

There once was a \_\_\_\_\_ from \_\_\_\_\_.  
 Who \_\_\_\_\_.  
 (So) s/he \_\_\_\_\_.  
 And \_\_\_\_\_.  
 That \_\_\_\_\_ from \_\_\_\_\_.

**Template - B:**

I once met a \_\_\_\_\_ from \_\_\_\_\_.  
 Every day s/he \_\_\_\_\_.  
 But when(ever) s/he \_\_\_\_\_.  
 The \_\_\_\_\_.  
 That \_\_\_\_\_ from \_\_\_\_\_.

- ❖ Here are some to amuse and inspire you!! Also a GREAT way of improving students' phonological skills, not to mention increasing their vocabulary!!

There once was a lady from Niger  
 Who smiled as she rode on a tiger  
 They returned from the ride  
 With the lady inside  
 And the smile on the face of the tiger

A pet store employee named Blair  
 Was missing a small patch of hair  
 A tarantual crawled  
 To the spot that was bald  
 And nobody noticed it there

There once was a lady from Hyde  
Who ate some green apples and died  
The apples fermented  
Inside she lamented  
And made cider inside her insides

Who said, it is just as I feared
